Conner Morison received his Bachelor of Science from the University of St Andrews, Scotland, in 2019. He went on to obtain a Master of Science by Research from the same institution in 2021 for a thesis that investigated the preservation of tephra (volcanic ash) deposits from the eruptions of Eyjafjöll (2010) and Grímsvötn (2011) in Iceland. He is currently a PhD researcher at the School of GeoSciences, University of Edinburgh. His doctoral research is currently investigating the environmental and societal impacts of the Eldgjá flood-lava eruption (c. 939 AD) in Iceland, focussing primarily on the physical and chemical characteristics of tephra fallout from explosive Icelandic eruptions. He also has a long-standing interest in the hazard potential of Mount Garibaldi, a long-dormant volcano in the Pacific Northwest. A publication that he co-wrote with volcanologist Catherine Hickson was one of Canadian Journal of Earth Sciences' most downloaded articles of 2023. He has also published work in *Treatise on Geomorphology*, *Volcanica* and *The Holocene*.
